



## Leadership Message

The Mark Preece Family House provides a safe, affordable, and accessible place to stay for families traveling to Hamilton to be with loved ones receiving care in any of the city's incredible hospitals.

Through 2024, we served almost 700 families who stayed a combined 5,700 nights at the House. Pause for a minute to consider the magnitude of those statistics, and what our mission might mean to those families, who would otherwise be forced to stay in hotels or drive for hours and hours every day to be with their loved ones. Our average stay is approximately five nights, and our longest stay through 2024 was 261 nights. If you've been to the House

# Finding Comfort Beyond the Hospital Walls

A Survivor's Story at The Mark Preece Family House

When a fire and explosion left him with third-degree burns over 47% of his body, the last thing Kelley Laflamme or his family expected was to find a sense of peace, community, and healing just steps away from the hospital. But that's what they found at The Mark Preece Family House.

After being admitted to Hamilton General Hospital, Laflamme, from Perth, Ontario, spent over six months undergoing intensive treatment and surgeries. The physical toll was immense, but the emotional weight on his family was just as heavy. For his loved ones, being able to stay at MPFH became more than just temporary housing. It was a space to breathe. A space to cope. And a space to connect.

"My sister and my mom would cook with the other guests. They wouldn't talk, but they would cook, and they'd share ingredients, and they'd share each other's meals. There was a language barrier, but it's a good way of coping through cooking and everything."

Though Kelley was in recovery, he was able to visit the House several times. "It gave me a break from the hospital. Just being wheeled over and having coffee here felt like therapy."

His sister flew in from Japan on short notice, completely panicked after hearing the news. The House gave her a place to stay nearby where she could be close, involved, and grounded. His father, initially so shaken he left his hotel room mid-stay without collecting his things, found calm and comfort at the House.

"It gave me a break from the hospital. Just being wheeled over and having coffee here felt like therapy."

As he healed physically, the relationships he built during his stay helped him heal emotionally. From late-night conversations with other guests to small but profound moments of connection, the House became a haven of humanity.

During a return visit for treatment, Kelley stayed at MPFH and interacted with other guests saying, "Last time, I had a conversation with this lady. Her husband had suffered significant burns as well, and she just recognized some of the injuries and was curious about how it would fare. I told her what to expect attitude wise, reaction to the medication, and everything." Laflamme continued, "It's nice to talk to people because it's like they just want to talk and not necessarily about their problems, but they understand that you are facing problems as well."

After returning for laser treatment and follow-up surgeries, Kelley sees his visits to Hamilton differently. What was once a city filled with painful memories has become a place of comfort. "The staff and volunteers at The Mark Preece Family House don't talk to you like a patient or a guest. It's like getting a call from your aunt, asking when you're coming by for the weekend. That warmth—that feeling of home—is something I'll never forget."

During his recovery, a total of seven members of Kelley's family stayed at The Mark Preece Family House before he was released from the hospital.

### **FINANCIAL REPORT**

The financial statements of Hospital Family Houses of Ontario for the year ended December 31, 2024 were audited by Pettinelli Mastroluisi LLP and are available on our website. This report should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements.

#### **REVENUE**

During the 2024 fiscal year, the House generated revenues of \$999,522. Excess of revenues over expenses totaled \$125,799.

#### **EXPENSES**


Expenditures incurred during the fiscal year totalled \$873,723.
